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Entering virtual reality is fun, but it can also be productive: Lately, I've found it a fairly decent way to get in a quick workout. However, strapping on a VR headset does require me to untether from my phone and miss out on all the scintillating messages my friends are sending my way—or at least, it did. If you're an Oculus Quest owner, you can now get all of your iPhone's notifications sent right to your virtual screen (and soon, Android users will get the opportunity as well). To get started, you'll need to be running Oculus system software v29. To check if you are, simply put on your headset and visit Settings > About in the main Oculus interface. Any available system updates should be apparent once your Oculus headset finishes checking for them, and you'll be able to download them and install them directly. (For what it's worth, I don't have v29 yet on my device, because Facebook likes to roll these updates out. Patience is a virtual virtue, too.) Once you have that update, visit the "Notifications" section of the Oculus Quest or Quest 2's Settings menu. There, you'll see a new option to enable: "iPhone Notifications in VR." However, you're not quite done. You'll also need to install the Oculus app on an iPhone newer than the 2016 iPhone 7. Finally, sign into your Oculus account and enable notifications via your profile image in the upper-left corner > Account Settings > Notifications. While you're there, scroll through the many available options to set up which Oculus notifications you'd like to receive in VR, and which you'd like to keep to your iPhone. Thereafter, your notifications pop up while you're in virtual reality, and you can also view them via a new "Phone" section in the normal Notifications screen on your device. No new notifications You'll get updated when important things are happening, and when you engage with our community. If you have a backup, connect your iPhone to your computer and enter Recovery Mode to restore it to iOS 14. Without a backup, tap Settings > General > Transfer or Reset iPhone to reset your iPhone to factory settings and lose all files. Remove the beta profile by tapping Settings > General > VPN & Device Management > iOS Beta Software Profile > Remove Profile. This article teaches you how to downgrade from iOS 15 to iOS 14 through two methods: delete the beta profile information and why you might want to downgrade. When downgrading from iOS 15 to iOS 14, you have two options on how to do so. It depends on if you created a backup on your Mac beforehand. Here's how to restore the earlier backup, providing you made one. This method requires you to have made a backup on your computer before you updated to iOS 15. Also note that downgrading from a public version of iOS to a previous version is not supported by Apple and downgrading to an unsupported version of iOS such as iOS 14 is considered a major security risk. Connect your iPhone to your Mac or PC with a Lightning or USB-C cable. Make sure the backup is available on your computer. Enter Recovery Mode on your iPhone. When the restore option appears on your Mac or PC via Finder or iTunes, click Restore. Click Install when the prompt appears to restore your iPhone to the earlier version of iOS. If you didn't create an archived backup or don't mind losing all your existing data, it's possible to erase your iPhone and start over again. Here's how to do so. This method wipes everything off your iPhone and means you lose anything that isn't backed up on iCloud or elsewhere. Tap Settings. Tap General. Tap Transfer or Reset iPhone. Tap Erase all Content and Settings. Tap Continue. Enter your passcode. Tap Erase. Wait for your iPhone to be completely deleted and restored to factory settings. If you want to remove the iOS 15 beta profile information from your phone, that requires a slightly different process. It won't restore your phone to iOS 14, but it means that when the next public version of iOS is available, you'll revert to the non-beta version of the software. Here's what to do. Tap Settings. Tap General. Tap VPN & Device Management. Tap iOS Beta Software Profile. Tap Remove Profile. Restart your device for the changes to take effect. iOS 15 might be the future of iOS, but in a beta state, it can be unreliable. By downgrading to iOS 14, you get the most stable iOS experience and the latest security updates, but you miss out on some critical new iOS 15 features. Pokémon Quest caught a lot of folks off-guard with its surprise release. Launched last week on the Switch, some have called it one of the best free-to-play Pokémon games around (us included).
